EARTH MONTH IS AN AMERICAN CULTURAL TRADITION

On April 22, 1970, the first Earth Day was held across the United

States, mainly on college and university campuses. As the organizer for that event in Southern California, I am excited to see that the tradition continues. This is truly an American "happening" because most of the rest of the world celebrates World Environment Day on June 5. And it was done in a grassroots manner, preinternet and cell phones. While there was a national office, we basically used them to buy buttons, bumper stickers, posters, and t-shirts. We did everything locally regarding this "Environmental Teach-In." But now you can join in the celebrations which continue in this April.

In 2012, Educational Communications' Ecology Center of Southern California and Earth Cultures Project will have a table at the Beverly Hills Earth Day Celebration April 15 from 9 to 1. Check your local cities for events on April 21 and 22. There will be a festival from the 20-22 in Santa Monica and from the 21-22 in Topanga. Don't forget my talk on April 21 (see separate announcement). Amigos de Bolsa Chica in Huntington Beach from 10 to 3 will have a fun run/walk plus nature walks at the Ecological Reserve. Most libraries have free talks so ask your local branch what is happening at their site and in your community. And most parks and nature centers will have special hikes, walks, and talks. Throughout the month there are green building conferences, business sustainability summits and other talks, symposia, and performances. Check them out.

WHAN THAT APRILLE WITH HIS SHOURES SOTE

We call this newsletter "Culturally Speaking" and human culture is highly dependant on our ability to use Language. Of course we speak in many tongues that evolve, borrow from each other, divide into different languages, and sometimes become extinct.

So for the month of April I'm reminded of a classic piece of English literature that is almost unreadable to speakers of 21st century English, the Canterbury Tales by Geoffrey Chaucer who lived in the 1300's. I titled this piece with his opening line "whan that Aprille with his shoures sote" which means: "when that April with its wet showers".

OK, "whan" for when isn't too big a stretch to comprehend, add a syllable to April making "aPREEla", "SHOO rus" for showers and what in the world is "sote"?

"Sote" (pronounced SO-ta) means wet and gave us the words "sot" (a drunk) and "besotted" (intoxicated with love). Seven hundred years can make a lot of difference in a language!

Go back a thousand years and what is called "Old English" or "Anglo-Saxon" is incomprehensible to anyone who has not studied it as a foreign language! For example: "ure gedaeghwamliche hlaf syle us to-daeg" which is "give us this day our daily bread"! Broken down this is: ure=our gedaeghwamliche=daily hlaf=loaf (hence bread) syle=give (may be related to "sell") us=us (yay! The only word in this sentence that hasn't changed its appearance - but, it's pronounced "oos") to-daeg=today (pronounced "toe-da-ee").

Now you have something to ponder during the shoures of Aprille while awaiting the floures of May!

FLAMENCO by Assieh "La Mora"

Flamenco originated within the Gypsies and its geographical birthplace is Andalusia.

Spain. The word appears in literature in the late 1700s, yet, we do not have any valid written record of the music prior to second half of the 1900s. Flamenco is often improvised and spontaneous and is compared with Jazz.

The singing, guitar and dance are the 3 most important elements of this art.


Despite many theories about the origin of this art, what is obvious, is a definite influence of other cultural music and dance in flamenco and one of them is definitely the influence of music from Persia. As an Iranian flamenco dancer, teacher and choreographer, I was always fascinated by the connection between Iranian traditional folk music and dance and flamenco. The similarities which I

experienced, made me reach deeper into the history of this art: An energetic and passionatecombination of singing, guitar, dance, clapping and colorful costumes.

The influence of the 9th century Persian poet and musician, Zyriab, who settled in the city of Cordoba in southern Spain, in the music of Spain can't be denied. In fact he established a school of music in Cordoba and made the city an important center for music. Zvriab's composition are said to be found in many Flamenco songs. He is also credited with introducing to Spain the Persian lute which according to some, later become the Spanish guitar. Paco de Lucia, the flamenco phenomenon in the 1990s, has dedicated his album "Zyryab" to Zyriab . . . "Shiraz-born poet/musician."

I grew up among musicians and singers, mainly traditional and folk. Being Kurd on my father's side, naturally I was also introduced to Kurdish music and dance which is quite dynamic in rhythm as well as colorful in presentation. . . So my first encounter with flamenco was quite interesting because I felt very close to it. Even though I could not understand Spanish, I was able to feel their singing. Later on, when I began teaching flamenco, I realized that my Iranian students had felt the same connection once they were introduced to flamenco.

Spain's famous poet and writer Federico Garcia Lorca (1898-1936) called flamenco one of the most gigantic inventions of the Spanish people. The tragic lyrics and tones of flamenco clearly reflect the suffering of the gypsy people.

events today, in 1970 volunteers from various nonprofit organizations brought tables and put out literature and invited people to come to a free program to try to get them to sign petitions, write letters, and join their cause. Businesses basically boycotted the activities because at the time it was the "environment versus the economy," at least to them. Now we know that as every business seems to want to promote their "greeness" that ecological sustainability is good for the environment and the economy and necessary to save our planet earth. Back then, activists weren't afraid to discuss the overpopulation problem (now almost taboo), pushed for saving wildlife and wilderness, and advocated less consumerism. The trend now is simply to talk about global warming/climate change, urge purchase of products that are organic and "natural," and emphasize how to make money by being greener. I would love to see a blend of the old with the new.

During that first 1970 event, I organized 1,000 bicyclists to ride down Wilshire Boulevard in Los Angeles to promote alternative transportation. Finally the area is developing some bike paths. We didn't bother to get permits because bicycles are legal on the roads. And we had fun, too, wearing gas masks and parading around as our favorite animal friends (unlike so many of the new expos and programs that I attend where a business suit is proper attire). Nonetheless, the 2012 Earth Day events should be worth going to. Most have free speakers and music, literature tables, and children's activities.

There has been a shift in cultural attitudes toward protecting our earth, living more sustainability, and having a smaller footprint on the planet. Please do your part and join in this cultural experience.

One very cold, wet night in December, after performing gypsy dances in the mud at the wedding of an unnamed very famous musician, my friend and I went back to her house wet and freezing. Her mother served us the most delicious Estonian traditional hot spiced red wine. It really hit the spot. As we sat and talked and warmed up, I felt something at my feet. It was their dog, happily eating the mud off my shoes! Each to his own.


